Existing Railroad Stations in NY State

It has been ten years since I first became acquainted with Charles Woolever and his Existing Railroad Stations in NY State web site. At that time Charles was living in the Binghamton area and I had just moved back to Rochester.

Charles was undertaking a project to document every existing railroad station in the State of New York. That is no small feat in a state with 61 counties, and many of the rail lines long since removed. To complicate matters, many stations have been relocated or substantially altered.

Through a network of people located around the state, Charles has put together a great resource for those interested in local and railroad history.

The site is organized by county, so it is easy to find if a station has been documented. Once you find your county, the railroads are listed in alphabetical order. Each existing station includes a photo, information on its construction, and whether it was used for freight or passenger service.

I attended the Fall NRHS Board of directors meeting on November 12, 2006. It was held in Huntsville Alabama and sponsored by the North Alabama Chapter. The big topic for discussion was the late National Bulletins and the late and incorrect National Dues renewal notices and member cards.

The cause of all of Nationals troubles is very lengthy and complicated. It all centers around the fact that the NRHS is an all volunteer organization. That is, with the exception of one paid office person. All but the printing and mailing is done by volunteers. The text is typed and the photos are scanned into the computer to produce press ready copy for the printer. There were three people doing the bulletins and another just to do the Annual Society Activities Bulletin. They got their work out OK but problems developed with the printers and mailing contractors. Then two of the volunteers were unable to continue helping. Today there is enough material to publish 6 bulletins but no one to do the composing and scanning.

Several years ago a volunteer offered to write a program to better handle the membership records. This would allow for easier and faster production of dues renewal billing and better statistical information. After two years and a system which seemed to work the volunteer had to quit. Last years dues notices had to be produced by volunteers and the paid office person who had little knowledge of the new system. Today the office volunteers had the dues notices ready and sent them to the contractor for assembly and mailing on time. The contractor subcontracted cutting the membership cards and that

did not get done on time. So the renewal notices are 3 weeks late. Why can't the contractors get things out on time? Only a large contract firm is able to do the job National needs done. Nationals job is a small part of their business so they don't give it priority.

National still is, getting renewal notices out, running Rail Camp, running the library, scheduling conventions, preserving films, coordinating Operation Lifesaver and other things.

Therefore the Officers and Directors have concluded that National must change how it does business. They will change from business as a railroad to business as a nonprofit. You thought they already are nonprofit. Well they are, but haven't thought like one. There are management firms that specialize in working for non-profits. They have a staff that handles many non-profits so the cost of a computer system ETC. is spread over many organizations. For instance they can handle membership. They send out notices, receive the dues and keep the records. They can take the content for the bulletins and get them printed and mailed.


The 2007 Chapter calendar contains full color photographs of the various cars that operated on the Rochester Subway.

Motive Power Report

Gasoline Locomotives:

Plymouth BL: Progress on our Plymouth locomotive continues. A new control and instrument panel is being fabricated. This will have gauges to monitor the health of the Buda engine as well as controls for headlights and cab lights that will eventually be added to the locomotive. An oil bath air cleaner that was recycled from some surplus equipment has been cleaned up and repainted. A mounting for the air cleaner has been fabricated and attached to the engine. Sheet metal to cover the cab roof, engine canopy top and cab sides has been ordered. This will further complete the exterior of the locomotive.

TrackMobs TM-2: Don Pohler, Rand Warner, Bob Mader and Norm Shaddick performed tune-up work on the Trackmobile TM-2. With a little more work, this will be placed back in service for light-duty switching around the shop.

Diesels:

For the second month in a row, our two trusty **GE 80-ton center cab locomotives** were called upon to perform some work for us. This month, we went up to the West side of the NYMT Loop, and retrieved a total of four freight cars plus one caboose. Since we did not have a practical way to break up the train, we took it all at once, through the Loop Switch, and over the very steep grade to the south. We believe that this was the longest and heaviest train, ever to traverse this section of track (two eighty tonners, and five cars, for a total of more than 300 tons). It's a tribute to our train crews, our Motive Power volunteers, and the continued good work of our track gangs, that this movement came off without a problem.

The **RG&E 1941** had more work performed by the team of Luther Brefo and Joe Nugent. They have taken on the task of removing the paint from the cab ceiling of this loco. For those that haven't seen it, this engine has had many coats of paint applied

in the cab over the years, and these various layers of paint have dried up, pealed, and partially fallen off. Luther and Joe have done some great work, in very unpleasant conditions, using a needle scaler to remove this loose paint, on the ceiling. Most of the cab ceiling has now been stripped, thanks to their willingness to do this tedious, messy job.

Norm Shaddick serviced the batteries on the 1843 this month. He also drained water from the fuel sump of the EK-6.

The seven battery chargers that we now have in service, one for each diesel, were checked out for proper operation by John Redden.

Steam:

Dave Chapus and John Redden have removed more paint from the cab of the #12, on a Tuesday evening. Dave Luca moved three switch timbers up to the Building. These timbers are almost precisely the correct size for the front pilot beam on the 12. They will be trimmed and fitted to the front of the locomotive in the coming months.

Thanks to our multi-talented team, we have another very useful piece of equipment in operation. In fact, we have late-breaking news that it was already put into service, helping to make a mount for the air-cleaner on the Plymouth locomotive.

- Forest to Sawmill: Flat cars and log bunks for lumber and logs.
- Well to You: Tank cars for water and petroleum products.
- Bank to Kiln: Hoppers and gondolas for stone, sand and other aggregates.
- Products to Stores: Box cars for consumer/commercial/industrial goods.
- Where's the Beef: Cattle car for cattle on the hoof (from BOCESS?)

Mystery photo revealed

Well, how did you do with last month's mystery photo?

[Ed. Plans were to reprint the undoctored photo, but the deleted two details did now show well in the scans. This doctored photo is being reprinted with the hope that Bob's other comments will be visible. Also there was problems in printing the November issue.]

The two small changes were: First the tower number showed and the East Rochester lettering on the water tower was faintly visible. Thanks to Chris Hauf for electronically erasing those to make it a little harder for you to identify the location. This view was taken just west of Washington Street in East Rochester looking east on the New York Central main line.

Of particular note is the fact that this photo was taken in 1953 when Washington Street was being changed from a grade crossing to an underpass. If you look

carefully you can see two grade crossings and two grade crossing watchman shanties. The first grade crossing and shanty are Washington Street. The second grade crossing and shanty are for a temporary crossing to be used while the underpass was being constructed. It was located approximately where Maple Street is today. Also if you look up in the trees to the right you will see a workman doing some preparatory work on the overhead wires in the area. And lastly the switch in the right foreground was for a siding that led into the Piano Works.

We are also showing a photo that was taken from the tower again looking east. An L3a Mohawk is leading train #8 heading west toward Rochester and beyond. Today the freight station in the background is Despatch Junction, a model railroad hobby shop. Our thanks to member Bill Chapin, who took these photos, for loaning them to us.

In Regards to Norwood & St. Lawrence Locomotive #210

Back in the Spring of 1947, I was working with the Chief Boiler Inspector, Tony Desorbo by name, when N&St.L locomotive #210 came into shop "D" at New York Central's West Albany steam locomotive back shop for an overhaul. The railroad had a policy of overhauling short lines locomotive that interchanged with NYC. When the cab, boiler jacket, and insulation (asbestos) were removed, what should we see but a 2-inch long crack in the knuckle of the backhead flange! According to Interstate Commerce Rules & Regulations, the backhead should have been replaced. Instead, the crack had been chipped out and welded closed-against all rules and regulations! NYC couldn't let this go by, so the backhead was removed, a new one formed up, and reapplied to the boiler. The #210 was duly overhauled and sent back for further service. I suspect that the backhead of #210 at Scranton, PA, is the one we applied back in 1947!

As of a year ago, the water column (plug) was still in place in the yard at Norfolk, NY. Quite likely it could be re-activated! Also, in the engine house at Norfolk is a General Electric 70-ton diesel-electric locomotive with a Cooper-Bessmer oil engine that is completely worn out and is unserviceable

Hausler continues "wireless" telegraphy

[A telegraph demo on was held Saturday, November 11, 2006 via the Internet. Unfortunately the volunteer workers had left for the day, leaving Chris Hausler alone to keep the fires — and sounder clicking! Here is his comments.]

Hi All,

For the third time now, I've been part of an internet "way wire" from the agent's office of our depot. I had just gotten back from my latest two week trip out of a several months effort for CSX in Atlanta on Friday (hopefully for the last time :-), so I didn't have any time to put out a notification. Anyway, this one was more significant than the last two as it signaled the beginning of what we hope is a future "depot net", where telegraph operators located within a number of preserved railroad stations connect via the internet periodically on such a "way wire" (or as I like to think, a "wayward wire" :-)

I had received an email several days ago announcing that there was to be a first telegraph demonstration at the restored MILW depot in Cle Elum, WA on Saturday afternoon, and requesting other telegraphers to get on the "wire" to make the demonstration more realistic. As it turned out there were about a half a dozen on the wire including one from New Zealand, but I was the only other one operating from a real RR depot. This morning [Sunday], I received the following email due to my participation. I thought I would share it with you.

By the way, although we were on the wire earlier, the demonstration didn't actually start until about 5 PM after the rest of the volunteers had left for the day. As I sat there, on a chilly fall day with a hot fire in the depot stove to keep me warm and only the light over the agents desk for illumination, I was alone, except that is, for the chattering telegraph sounder to keep me company. Not exactly like the "night tricks" of old but similar enough to allow me to think back to the many stories I've read and dream...

From *Railroad Magazine*, April 1940, page 96:

"Out of Buffalo, April 21

"The Buffalo and Syracuse Divisions of the Railroad Enthusiast, Inc. together with the Rochester chapter of the National Railway Historical Society, are jointly sponsoring an excursion of unusual interest. The trip is indorsed by RAILROAD MAGAZINE. The route will be from Buffalo (Central Terminal), Rochester and Syracuse, to Oneida via New York Central. At the last mentioned point, excursionists will board the only passenger train of the New York, Ontario & Western Railroad, for a ride to Sidney, where photographs may be had of the roads' motive power. Times of departure from the home cities of the three organizations will be Buffalo: 6.00 a.m., Rochester: 7.19 a.m., and Syracuse: 9.02 a.m. Returning the train will arrive at these points, in the reverse order, at 7.04, 8.36 and 9.50 p.m. Rates and further information may be had from Roy M. Zimmerman,..Buffalo; .. Ward C.S. Shafer,..Rochester; .. Charles Rich,..Syracuse; and Hobart Price..Utica."

Rand noted that this was 66 years ago, and the Chapter was only three years old!


