25th Anniversary Weekend Firsts


Rand Warner

Our 25th Anniversary Celebration over four days was a great success, thanks to the combined efforts and hard work, dedication, motivation, and commitment of a large group of volunteers. We hosted our Chapter Thursday evening, July 18, hosted dignitaries and media Friday morning, hauled 440 passengers from the general public through our Museums on Saturday, and an amazing 712 passengers through on Sunday! Restoration Building Progress

Land is being cleared of track materials and other supplies using our Lorain clam crane and Cat D-7 dozer, operated by George Knab and supported by many volunteers on the ground.

Most of you have seen the beautiful diorama model of the new building made by Don Shilling.

John Weber has prepared a preliminary site plan which has been submitted to the Town of Rush.



As we had predicted in the last Semaphore issue. George Knab has moved the Ford forklift, the Cat D-7 bulldozer and the Lorain yard crane (both of the latter donated to the Chapter by Rochester Asphalt Materials, Inc.) up to the restoration building site. Since the, George and Dave Luca have enlisted the aid of many of our stalwart volunteers to sort and stack rail and ties. Literally hundreds of rail sections and ties have been sorted and stacked. George has worked the Lorain crane many hours, and the Lorain has proven to be a gutsy, responsive worker.

Meanwhile, back in the equipment display area, Tom Phillips has been quietly working away on the Barber Greene crawler conveyor, and is very close to having this venerable old machine fired up again. We can't wait to hear it run again.

In the last issue we promised you more acquisitions. On Saturday, July 27, 1996, early in the morning, we drove two (2) Mack trucks into the display area!

Through the kind assistance of member Dave Goodwin, who is also Town Highway Superintendent for the Town of Clarkson, the Chapter purchased a Mack Model R-600 single axle diesel dump truck from the Town of Clarkson. The dump truck is scheduled to be put to work soon on the 25th Anniversary Restoration Building site development project.

On the same morning, Joe Scanlon and George Knab pulled in with a 1965 Mack Model B-30 single axle water tank truck. This truck was acquired for Chapter use from Mr. George Sperzio of Construction Services, Inc. Once again, we have acquired a historically significant truck,

since this is the last year (1965) that Mack manufactured the 'B' models.

But wait -- we're not done yet -- we saved the best for last. George Knab, with the help of Dave Goodwin, has moved his 1923 Keystone excavator into the equipment display area. The Keystone is a huge museum display piece, and a fine example of early attempts in the equipment industry to develop a high production excavator. The Keystone skimmer is powered by a four cylinder Climax gas engine and is in running condition! The Keystone is a great addition to our heavy equipment display.

You are encouraged to come out to the Depot and see our new acquisitions. You are also encouraged to come out and help with the equipment, since there is more than enough restoration projects to go around. Contact Joe Scanlon, George Knab or Rand Warner for more details.



Rules are Rules --- Aren't They ??

On the railroad, rules are usually inflexible, and the meaning are clear. If a rule advises you on a plan of action, there is no way you can subvert that. However, some rules can be bent -carefully.

Take for instance Rule No. 14: When two main tracks are numbered, and for three or more main racks the following whistle signals will be used:

- ---- flagman may return from east or north on No. 1 track.
- ---- flagman may return from south or west on No. 2 track.
- east or north on No. 3 track.
- - 0 flagman may return from south or west on No. 4 track.

One day at Wayneport where all trains stopped to clean their fires and to take on coal, two westbound freights q tracks 1 and 3 were being serviced the same time. The man on track 1 was ready to leave so he blew the signal for this tracks which was 5 long blasts on his whistle. This took a little time, and the man on 3 was ready before the man on 1 had blown his fifth long whistle and as soon as the man on one had finished, the man on three blew one short whistle. The two flagmen standing well to the rear of the two trains heard five long blasts of the whistle (the man on track one) and one short blast (the man on track 3) so the flav returned to the train and they departed Wayneport. The engineman on the train on track 1 did not understand what went on for a few minutes. The rules weren't bent, but they had been twisted that day.



A thank you to Bob Mader's friend for three bales of straw. The straw was used as a "mud" cover at Friday's Ground Breaking for the press and dignitaries.










