As I look back on 2007 and review 2007 editions of The Semaphore for memory joggers, I am amazed at the amount and variety of accomplishments and activities our talented volunteers have undertaken. There are really too many things to completely capture all of them, but there are some very notable highlights, including:

Relocation of Chapter archives from Webster facility to climate-controlled storage and move of lending library materials to the 40&8. Development and implementation of online commerce through our website, eBay and Amazon, and tremendous contributions to the Chapter through mail order and train show sales.



EXCURSION WINDOW PROJECT MOVES AHEAD

The cold winter months have proven a good time for the excursion window crew to make progress on replacing the glazing in windows from the Chapter's *Empire State Express* train set.

The Stillwell car now spots three heated workstations, storage areas and room for a possible fourth work station. We now have a drill press at our disposal, courtesy of Lynn Heintz.

While the cold weather resulted in several weekday work sessions being canceled and outside work being cut short, we over-achieved our goal of finished windows during February.

Four window modules were completed in February (one more than our goal of three units). We enter March with three additional units being worked on. To date, we have completed four large modules (compared to a year-to-date goal of six units).

The crew of Dave Peet, Bob Achilles, Joel Shaw, Tony Mittiga, Bill Blasei, Bob Mader, Lynn Heintz and Dale Hartnett continues to experiment with ways to make the job easier and more effective.

Dave Peet's purchase of a cordless electric impact driver has helped immensely in removing old corroded screws from window frames.

Thanks also go to Kevin Klees for coordinating the purchase of screws to support the project. Jeremy Tuke has continued to secure replacement glazing, along with the drops which we intend to cut for the smaller windows from the excursion set. Bob Mader has played a key role in saving the Chapter substantial money by building a jig for cutting the rounded corners in the glazing

[Based on article from June 1931 Railroad Man's Magazine. The article goes on, but this was so near and dear to my heart, I thought that it was worth sharing with the group.]

"In 1879 E.H. Harriman married Mary Williamson Averell, the daughter of William J. Averell, a banker of Ogdensburg, New York, who was president of the Ogdensburg & Lake Champlain Railroad Company. The relationship aroused his interest in up-state transportation and two years later his career as a rebuider of bankrupt railroads began with a small broken-down railroad called the Lake Ontario Southern which he renamed the Sodus Bay & Southern, reorganized, and sold with considerable profit to the Pennsylvania.

One of my winter time pursuits is catching up on my reading, or just rereading some of the books and magazines in my collection. One title caught my eye: "P.R.R. Collects Relics for Museum". Quoting now -

"Relics of early days of railroading are being collected by the Pennsylvania Railroad for use in a museum to be established in Philadelphia. Employees from all over the line are sending contributions. From Elmira, N.Y. came the desk, chair, and clock used by the late E.H. Harriman when he began his railroad career on what is now the Pennsy's Elmira Division."

Jim Johnson and Rand Warner have been reviewing and discussing power loads and voltage options for our new three-phase service request to National Grid.

This new service will support our excursion trainset, on the new siding west of the LA&L RR, the several trailers located there now, and any future buildings on the west side of the LA&L main.

We are asking National Grid to quote us this service two ways:

- a) 480v/277v 400amp, three-phase
- b) 208v/120v, 400amp, three-phase

We had originally requested a threephase 240v, 400amp service, but that option is no longer available from National Gird.

Fatal train wrecks declined in 2007

In 2007, 486 people nationwide were killed after trespassing on rail lines, compared to 518 in 2006. An additional 339 fatalities involved trains and a car/truck, 30 fewer than in 2006. Total number of train accidents fell by almost 14% to 2,547.

In contrast the number of rail accidents that released hazardous material rose to 43 from 28 in 2006. Contributing factors: more trains carrying ethanol and new technologies used to safely release the fuel. [USA Today from FRA Report]

We hope to begin construction of trackage south of the Restoration Building as soon as weather permits, and as soon as some heavy construction equipment and trailers are relocated out of the way.

LA&L RR will be installing our new switch for the new siding for our excursion train set, possibly starting work by the time you read this—weather permitting. Then we have to build the siding to hold the trainset cars, and also to be our entrance to Northwest Quadrant trackage and displays.

The LA&L RR will be installing a replacement entrance switch to our Depot yard area. This switch will be further north to eliminate the present kink coming in. We will then have to rearrange our yard lead to align up with this switch.

Museum Managers list 2008 Goals

Dave Luca and Chris Hauf met and made a list of the high and medium priorities of projects for 2008. They have the Board's approval The "high" priority is listed here, along with the projected quarter, [Q]

Infrastructure

Install Tracks #6 & #7 south of the restoration building to allow all of the R&GVRRM equipment to be stored north and south of this building. This includes all grading, drainage installation, sub-ballast install and track install. [O1,O2]

Install first ~375' of the LA&L siding including all equipment relocation, drainage installation, grading, subballast, track install and tack leveling/ballasting. Clear property, grade & sub-ballast for next 500'. [all Qs]

Re-build Industry yard lead to mate up with new Industry yard turnout including all drainage required. [Q3,Q4]

Equipment

RG&E 1941 mechanical & cosmetic restoration complete [Q1,Q2,Q3]

Track cars (Qty 2) prepared for 2008 operating season. [Q1,Q2]

EK#6 brake work complete. [Q1]

R&GVRR 1654 water pump replacement. [Q2]

ESE car work including window replacement, exterior cleaning/repainting/lettering, interior repairs, and running repairs. [all Qs]

Operations

More Anniversaries 2008

30th Anniversary of arrival of first railroad car on our Museum property: B&O Caboose #2631, shipped in from former storage location on siding at South Lima, on LA&L RR. We did not yet have our switches installed to Conrail, so we slid the caboose over to our #1 siding track from LA&L (Conrail) main track, using greased rails and a bulldozer pulling it over with cables/chains. This caboose is now being back dated to its former Buffalo Rochester & Pittsburg RR configuration.

Tenth Anniversary of arrival of our first trolley, Rochester Subway Car #60, at our Museum, trucked in from NYS Museum at Albany. We had to tear down a building around the trolley and build a short length of track, to get it moved out to where we could load it on a special rear-steerable lowboy to bring it home. This car was essentially 100% complete when it arrived so we towed it around our Museum property tacks to give people rides. Then we moved it into the newly erected Restoration Building to begin an extensive restoration effort which is still ongoing.

Nevada Northern Railway steam locomotives taken out of service.

As of Feb. 21, 2008, the Nevada Northern Railway Museum of East Ely, Nev. removed 4-6-0 No. 40 and 2-6-0 No. 93 from active service after finding cracks in the axles.

Even after repairs, the railroad will have to refurbish the remaining axles, such as refurbish/replace the crown brasses, the drive boxes and shoes, and the wedges in both engines.

They estimated it will coast \$200,000 to repair each engine. Being short of funds, they will work on No. 93 first with anticipation it will be back in service by July 1, 2008.

Library Report
