LEGEND OF THE FIVE-SPOT

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If you've lived in Rochester for some amount of time, maybe you've heard about a steam engine that someone keeps in a shed in their front yard... Maybe you even remember seeing it on display outside of the scrap yard off on St. Paul Boulevard near High Falls... Maybe you were one of the lucky school children who visited years ago, but your fuzzy memory betrays you... Well, the legends are true! We're excited to announce Despatch Shops 0-4-0 tank engine No. 5 is coming home to our museum this summer.

Built in 1924 by Vulcan for use at Despatch Shops in East Rochester and retired in 1954, it was sold to Rochester Iron & Metal in 1955. John Virgilio wanted

the engine for his private museum, and purchased it in 1965. Many got to enjoy and learn from it over the years before John became too old to host tours, and the engine remained locked away on his property in Henrietta. After his passing in 2021, his family reached out to us as possile caretakers of the engine and other historic artifacts. We struck a deal in 2022, and we look forward to being the new home for Despatch Shops No. 5! You can read the full story starting on page 7.

Our annual Rails & Ales event returned on May 21 to sold-out crowds. More than 300 visitors attended the event with more than a dozen local craft breweries and distilleries in attendance. Our Wine & Cider trains on May 22 did not do as well, with several vendors canceling at the last minute, and fewer than 200 visitors in attendance. While we have great relationships with our local breweries, the wine industry seems inpenetrable, and therefore we will be discontinuing our Wine & Cider event. R&LHS TOUR - JUNE 2

On June 2, more than 70 members of the Railway & Locomotive Historical Society toured our museum as part of their annual meeting activities held in Rochester. Included was a behind the scenes tour of our shops and yards, and many photo stops. Organized by Paul Barnes, convention activities also included rides on the Arcade & Attica, Finger Lakes Railway (and tour of the CNY Chapter NRHS museum at Martisco), a tour of American Motive Power in Dansville, and programs presented by museum members Otto Vondrak about the history of railroads in Rochester and David Monte Verde about Genesee Valley Transportation.

FATHERS DAY TRAIN RIDES JUNE 18 and 19

Attendance was light for our Fathers Day Train Rides, but it didn't dampen the spirits of our two live bands. Visitors enjoyed a high-energy performance by rock band The John Payton Project on Saturday, while on Sunday Bill Schmitt and the Bluesmasters provided the entertainment. Feedback from visitors was overall positive, but sales were way down from normal with only 96 tickets sold on Saturday and 166 on Sunday. Stiff competition with other summertime festivals and activities most likely played a part in this, and hopefully we can adjust our marketing program to raise future sales.

NEW METALWORKING SHOP

Fulfilling one of our shared goals for many years, manager Bill Marcotte has completed the set-up of the new metalworking area on the west side of the Restoration Shop. The tools and working space are there for anyone to use, and if you require



training on their proper use, just ask. This includes welding tools, cutting torches, the drill press, metal brake, and anything else used to bond, bend, or cut metal. Thanks to the Construction Dept. for the heavy lifts, and also to Mike Guglielmo for help wiring up the new overhead lighting.

MECHANICAL DEPT. UPDATE

The Mechanical Dept. is awaiting the return of rebuilt air brake valves for RG&E 41, LV 211, and LA&L 20 from Multi Service in Pittsburgh, Pa. In the meantime, other items have been checked off the 92-day



inspection list by Joe Nugent, Sam Rosenberg, Kurtis Hooey, and Justin Carmona.

LA&L 20 was fired up for the first time this year on June 11, thanks to Sam Rosenberg and Kurtis Hooey. The same team also fired up our ex-Army Fairbanks-Morse diesel 1843 on July 5, and ran a few test runs to clear out the cobwebs.

A successful "hammer and hydro" test on RG&E 41's main air reservoir was conducted on June 25. This requires us to drop the air tank from under the locomotive, fill it with water to a certain pressure, and then hammer to test for any defects. The tested tank has since be reinstalled under the engine, awaiting a return to service.

On July 2, Peter Gores made adjustments to the air brake linkages under our Lehigh

Valley boxcar so the piston travel on the main air cylinder is now within standards.

Sam Rosenberg and Chuck Whalen continue work on RG&E 8. Bob Ziegler is making repairs to the No. 1 engine head. Joe Nugent is getting a quote for engine cowl door repair and refinishing. Meanwhile, the goal is to get RG&E 41 and LA&L 20 in service in time for July and August events so RGV 54 can be cycled back through the shop for its next 92-day inspection. We are always looking for volunteers to join us!





REBUILDING TRACK 5

Working around public events and stifling heat waves, additional work was completed on Track 5 siding at Industry through the end of June and the beginning of July. Several volunteers worked to raise the "dip" near the dwarf signal so the old section of Track 5 was brought up to the new height of the rebuilt track. Some new ties were secured and spiked in place to complete this task.

The remainder of the ties on the east rail were spiked up, and stone was brought in and tamped. Thanks to Duncan Richards, Dale Hartnett, Jackson Glozer, Justin Carmona, Ian Flournoy, Kurtis Hooey, Otto Vondrak, Jeremy Tuke, Adam Lloyd, and many other volunteers who helped us complete this important rebuilding project. Once the final details are complete, look for the Lehigh Valley caboose, boxcar, and RS-3 211 to be placed on display through the summer! Don't be afraid to pitch in, we're always seeking new volunteers to join the Track Dockneys!

LEGEND OF THE FIVE-SPOT

If you grew up in Rochester, you probably heard about the man who saved a steam engine from a scrap yard and brought it to his home in Henrietta. Maybe you were one of the lucky few invited to visit it. Maybe you thought it was scrapped years ago. The legend of the "Five Spot" runs deep, but we're excited to share that not only is it real, but it's new home will be the Rochester & Genesee Valley Railroad Museum.

According to records, DSI 5 was purchased from Vulcan Iron Works in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., in 1924, for exclusive use at MDT's Despatch Shops in East Rochester, N.Y. The 0-4-0 saddle tank switch engine, serial no. 3343, was shipped to DSI on March 31, 1924. There, it was immediately put to work on a construction project to expand the storage yards around the shops, hauling side-dump cars full of dirt and debris. We assume it spent the rest of its career as a shop switcher working around the shops in various roles.

Steam operation on New York Central's lines east of Buffalo came to an end in 1954. When New York Central assumed control of the MDT shop in East Rochester in 1955, No. 5 was retired. The engine received a fresh paint job and was displayed outside the Despatch Shops offices before it was sold to Rochester Iron & Metal. It was placed on display outside the scrap yard's offices off St. Paul Blvd., next to the NYC main line at High Falls.

It was around this time John Virgilio took an interest in the engine. Following the tradition of his father, John enjoyed a brief career on the New York Central as a fireman and brakeman from 1949 until 1954 when diesels replaced steam. His family had been collecting railroad artifacts at their farm in Henrietta for some time, with the hopes of someday opening a museum where children could learn about the "golden age" of railroading that was rapidly disappearing. He made inquiries with RI&M, but the engine was priced just beyond his reach at \$3,500.

In 1964, RI&M was closing down its scrap metal operation on St. Paul Blvd., and considered lowering their asking price for the engine to just \$1,250. Virgilio was

working as a custodian for the Rush-Henrietta school district at the time, and launched an intense fundraising effort to cover the cost of purchasing the engine. After signing a promisory note to cover the balance, DSI 5 was moved to Henrietta on June 17, 1965, thanks to H.L. Baughmann Equipment for donating a trailer and Gottry Carting Co. for donating a crane for the lift.

John Virgilio formed the Mortimer Railroad Historical Society, named after the junction of the NYC, Erie, and Lehigh Valley located behind his home in Henrietta. He named his operation the Mortimer & Red Creek Railroad, and received a donation of rail from LV to build a few hundred feet of track on his property. One of the barns was filled with railroad tools, signals, signs, and memorabilia. Virgilio's private museum opened on June 11, 1966.


Over the years, may school groups came to tour the museum. Virgilio also had a hand-pump car that he would give school-children rides on the short track in his front yard. Tour buses also came calling over the years, but after complaints from his neighbors and worry about the security of the collection, public viewing came to an end.

A shed was erected around the steam engine in 1972 to protect it from the weather and possible vandalism.

Your museum began cultivating a relationship with the Virgilio family in 2017, when family friend Bill Meister arranged a private tour of the engine and collection. This relationship continued through the years, and when John passed away in 2021 at age 91, his son Barry reached out to us about finding a possible home for his father's legacy. After touring the collection again, and having Barry and his mother Phyllis tour our museum and facilities, it was agreed that we would be the new home for DSI 5. After some negotiation, an agreement for purchase of the locomotive and certain artifacts was reached in May 2022.

Once the locomotive arrives on our property, the first order of business will be to address the possibility of asbestos remediation. Our long-term plans include cosmetic restoration and putting the engine on display so visitors can walk through the cab. For now, your support is appreciated as we bring home another important piece of Rochester's rich railroading heritage.
